Organizing Workshops on newly introduced Semesterised UG curriculum

#### > Goal:

To prepare the faculty for curriculum transaction and delivery

#### > The Context:

The affiliating University, i.e., University of Calcutta announced the introduction of Semeste Ised Choice Based Credit System for undergraduate students seeking admission w.e.f. 2018-19 session. Affiliated colleges were directed to make all necessary arrangements for the same.

A workshop on the Semesterized CBCS as laid down in the revised C.U. Regulations reg. Admission & Examination at the undergraduate level was organised by the IQAC in May 2018 to acquaint teachers and staff about the new system.

The Dept. of Electronics of the College organized a workshop on new syllabus in Electronics (under CBCS) jointly with the UG Board of Studies in Electronics of the University of Calcutta in June 2018. The venue was the premises of Netaji Nagar Day College. Teachers from 18 other Colleges participated in the Workshop.

#### Evidence of Success:

The request from the UG Board of Studies in Electronics of the University of Calcutta to organize the Workshop jointly is a matter of great honour for the College. The participation of teachers from 18 colleges in the Workshop bears evidence of the success of this initiative.

#### > Problems encountered and Resource Required:

- i) Availability of adequate space to organize the Workshop due to the ongoing examinations of the University of Calcutta at the College centre .
- ii) Allocation of sufficient funds for the Workshop from internal resources

### **Best Practices (B)**

#### Title of the Practice:

Student enrichment programmes for providing adequate exposure to higher levels of learning.

#### ➤ Goal:

To orient the interested students about higher levels of learning, research activity and research environment.

#### > The Context:

A significant proportion of students of this institution are first generation learners. Hence it becomes the responsibility of the institution to provide them adequate exposure to higher levels of learning and research.

#### > The Practice:

Departments organize seminars and/or invited lectures wherein resource persons and eminent academicians are invited to deliver lectures. Students from Humanities participate in educational tours within the city during which teachers guide them to various destinations relevant to their respective disciplines. Students of Political Science participate in the Mock Parliament competition organised for college students by the Govt. Students from Science stream accompanied by teachers visit the laboratories of research institutions and interact with the faculty and researchers. For instance, 05 students from Physics dept. and 04 students from Chemistry dept. accompanied by one faculty member from the Dept. of Electronics participated in the 125<sup>th</sup> birth anniversary of Prof. S. N. Bose celebration organized by the S.N. Bose National Centre for Basic Sciences, Kolkata on 28<sup>th</sup> Feb. 2018. Prof. Bruce Tsurutani, Principal Scientist, Jet Propulsion Lab, California Institute of Technology, NASA, USA delivered a public lecture on this occasion. The students saw a documentary on the life and works of Prof. S. N.Bose, screened on this occasion. They also participated in a Quiz contest as a part of the said programme. It was a new kind of learning experience and enrichment for the students.

#### Evidence of Success:

The enthusiasm among students across all disciplines to participate in such student enrichment programmes bears evidence of their appeal to the learners. These programmes supplement the learner centred pedagogy which the institution strives to implement.

#### > Problems encountered & Resource Required:

- i) Availability of time within the academic session to devote for more student enrichment programmes.
- ii) Availability of funds from internal resources for such activities.
